

From the President

I am pleased to report that FFNSW has had a very successful and productive year. We had almost three times more new members joining us compared to the previous year and I believe we are well positioned for further success next year in honouring our charter to foster the growth and development of the folk arts in NSW.

First off I'd like to thank each and every committee member for their dedication over the year. We had many more meetings this year than in previous years, each was well attended and I think I can say that all on the committee actively contributed to the initiatives we instituted over the year.

Special thanks to Max Gregory who as well as being Vice-President, contributed creatively to so many of the year's events, assisted with IT, and in particular developed and ran the first two of a series of very well attended musician's workshops which we hope to continue on a regular basis in future years.

Thanks also to Treasurer Dallas Baxter for her patient attention to the finances and for promptly organising our public liability insurance as resolved at last year's AGM and to hubby James who with Dallas sees to the distribution of Cornstalk. Both Dallas and Jim are always ready to help, with a minimum of fuss, with so many tasks required for the smooth running of our organisation.

I would also like to thank Sophie Moore who despite being so busy in other enterprises bravely took on the role of secretary despite never having done the job previously, and a special thanks to the inimitable Margaret Walters who despite her own numerous commitments ably advised and assisted Sophie over the year.

As resolved at last year's AGM we had the pleasure of granting honorary life membership, in a surprise ceremony during the interval at a Loosely Woven concert in his majestic Humph Hall, to the irrepressible Wayne Richmond, our long-standing membership secretary who amongst many other services to our organisation also helps distribute Folkmail and E-Cornstalk and who developed and ran our JAM website for many years.

I also want to thank our very dedicated Cornstalk Editor Coral Vorbach who has soldiered on for most of this year despite some not insignificant personal hurdles and the indispensable Julie Bishop who week after week dutifully and consistently compiles our ever popular Folkmail.

A major task for the first half of the year was the launching and further development of our new website which the previous committee under Andy Busuttil's leadership had so ably initiated. Its capabilities were extended over the year to include a range of features making it more user friendly to members and affiliates such as folk clubs and festivals for to publicise their events, the facility for members to set up a directly accessible link to a personal 'mini website' for no cost, and many other new refinements.

This development of the website as a powerful new tool which the previous committee had the vision to initiate, continues as a work in progress and thanks are due to Wayne Richmond who helped us transition from the old JAM site and to retain it as an archive, to Tom MacDonald who assisted with IT, in particular in relation to the development of the new website until he was untimely ripped from us in order to further his study overseas, and to Max Gregory and

Terry Clinton who took over in Tom's absence. Terry and Max also helped us develop a new Facebook page with some assistance from long time member and Renaissance man Chris Maltby. Max also revamped the folk fed Google group to make it more user friendly. Thanks are also due to Ally Mosher our



ever cheerful and most patient webmaster who for a very reasonable fee provided the technical expertise to develop the website and continues to maintain it.

A major initiative during the year was the launching of our inaugural 'FFNSW Young Folk Music Artists Awards' and I am pleased to report that we had entries in both the Junior and under-25s categories. We hope to have some of these entrants perform at our 'End of Year Folk Bash' to be held on Sunday 2nd December at the Gaelic Club and expect to present the awards early next year. Thanks also to Andy Busuttil who offered free studio time to the recipient of the Junior Award, and to the friends of David O'Connor who have donated a cash prize for the under-25's award. I hope the awards will continue to be presented in years to come, encouraging young musicians to embrace the folk genre and assisting them via mentoring and other means to perfect their craft.

We held three social events during the year, first, in December, our regular and once again highly enjoyable and well attended 'End of Year Folk Bash' (organised by the ever energetic Margaret Walters), followed by 'Folk Feed The BBQ' organised by Tom MacDonald and held in February at Sydney Park which was a roaring success. The 'Picnic in the Park at Parramatta' held in June and ably organised by Allen Davis was also well attended and a good time was had by all.

We also initiated a monthly traditional song session organised by Ruby Foster and Sophie Moore as well as a monthly singer songwriter circle organised by yours truly. We assisted Solidarity Choir with auspicing for a grant received from Inner West Council and we supported the directors of the Northern Beaches Folk Festival in their application for a grant with the new Northern Beaches Council, which I'm happy to say I learnt just this week has been successful, allowing the festival to continue next year.

In August this year we presented a submission to the 'House of Representatives Standing Committee on the Arts Inquiry Into The Music Industry' presenting our view of the importance of Federal funding and support for the development of traditional and contemporary folk music and offering to engage in ongoing dialogue in relation to this at a federal level.

We also staffed an FFNSW information desks at Cobargo, St Albans and Kangaroo Valley Folk Festival and hope to continue to do so at as many festivals as possible in future to publicise and promote our services and initiatives and encourage new membership. I thank the organisers of those

festivals for offering us squatting rights. I would also like to encourage our members to drop us an email and volunteer to help us man these desks for a few hours when they're going to festivals, since this is a very valuable and effective means to further the cause. Though our membership has increased, bringing in slightly more revenue, and despite the generosity of many who offer us reduced fees as a not for profit organisation, the services required to support our infrastructure do not come cheaply in this day and age.

I would therefore like to draw the attention of members, affiliates and friends to the fact that we have a separate fund called 'The Folk Federation Fund' to which donations can be made which are fully tax deductible and the funds of which can be used at the discretion of FFNSW for the furtherance of our charter. It has also been suggested that we consider increasing membership fees next year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our public officer Bruce Cameron who throughout the year carried out his duties to perfection and David Weekes & Co. for once again kindly auditing our books.

To conclude I want to mention a very exciting development

which I dearly hope will come to fruition next year. FFNSW, in association with Warren Fahey, have been looking into the possibility of holding a Sydney Folk Festival to be held the weekend of 16th to 19th August next year located in Pitt St, Sydney at the 'Sydney Mechanics School of Arts' and the 'Pitt St Uniting Church'. Planning for the festival provisionally titled 'The Sydney Festival of Folklife and Song' is in its very early stages and in fact it is not yet certain whether it will go ahead at all. One suggestion is that it should aim primarily to introduce local traditional and contemporary folk performers of excellence to new Sydney audiences that may never have previously attended festivals or folk clubs. The aim would be for such a festival to become a popular annual event serving to foster renewed interest in folk within the broader community. A subcommittee consisting of Pam Davis, Margaret Walters, Peter Russell, Terry Clinton and myself has been formed to liaise with Warren Fahey to further develop this project.

Thank you all for coming to our AGM. Thanks to all our members and affiliates for your ongoing support and participation and for helping us in our endeavour to make folk flourish.

End of Year Folk Bash

The Folk Federation has been running their end of year variety concert for the last five years at the Gaelic Club, upstairs at 64 Devonshire Street. Surry Hills. This year's event takes place on Sunday 2nd December from 1.30pm – music starts promptly, so aim to get there around 1pm. All welcome. Admission is \$15, Folk Fed members \$10.

Artists this year include folk favourites and some newer performers but the piece de resistance as always is the Mummers Play presented by members of Black Joak Morris. Descriptions of the artists follow below.

We'll post the timetable on the Facebook page once confirmed. But as usual the afternoon includes some complimentary refreshments, a range of performers and a carol singing session.

The roadworks in the area make it sensible to travel by train if you can. The nearest parking station is the Goulburn St. one on the corner of Elizabeth St.

Corella is a community choir that started life eight years ago as a staff & parents choir at Darlington Public School. A few locations & line-ups later, the choir is now open to all who enjoy the buzz of singing a wide-ranging repertoire in harmony. Christina Mimmocchi has been the group's leader since it started.

Some of the performers who entered the FFNSW Young People's Folk Awards have been invited to participate in the afternoon concert. They include Allegra Dunning, a 10 year old Folk/Americana singer songwriter from the Blue Mountains who performs a mix of original songs and covers she has rearranged on both guitar and ukulele. Josh Maynard is a 20- year-old folk alternative singer songwriter based in Cowra, NSW, whose influences include Bob Dylan, Shane Howard, Redgum,

Paul Kelly, and Missy Higgins. He has been performing since the age of 13 and already has chalked up an enviable list of festivals he's performed at. Cam Lawrence is 22 and his style is mostly relaxed finger picking and some bluesy and reggae influences. He sings, plays guitar and harmonica and occasionally uses a foot tambourine.

Illawarra Folk Festival

Illawarra music fans will get to see one of the hottest acts touring Australia in 2019 when Irish Mythen returns to Bulli Showground for the 34th Illawarra Folk Festival on 17th - 20th January 2019.



The Irish-born, Canadian-based singer-songwriter wowed audiences with her power-packed performances at the 2016 Illawarra Folk Festival, and organisers are delighted to welcome her back in January.

Irish Mythen, who has played with such international stars as Rod Stewart, Gordon Lightfoot and Lucinda Williams, will follow her Illawarra appearance with spots at the National Folk Festival in Canberra and at the Byron Bay Bluesfest, where organisers have dubbed her a "must-see artist".

Illawarra Folk Festival Artist Director David De Santi said having Irish Mythen back on the Bulli bill for the 2019 festival was a real coup.

"Irish Mythen was the sensation of our 2016 festival, so we are thrilled to have her back," Mr De Santi said. "She has a very big touring schedule next year, and it is great that people will be able to see her at the beginning of the year at the Illawarra Folk Festival."

"2019 will herald a new era of new emerging and established acts. The Illawarra Folk Festival has been renowned for recognising new talent but also not forgetting its traditional folk roots," Mr De Santi. (20/10/1935 - 20/11/2018)



The music world has been deeply saddened by the death of Roy Bailey, a giant of English folk music and much-loved by legions of fans in Australia since he began visiting these shores in the early 1990s. Roy had the finest voice, an uncanny ability to uncover and arrange multitudes of wonderful songs, an astonishing rapport with his audiences, and a passionate commitment to social justice.

These things shone through more than 20 albums recorded from his first solo vinyl in 1971 to his last, a live concert recorded in 2015 at his beloved Towersey Festival just before his 80th birthday.

Many of you would have known Daryl Powell.

Daryl passed away peacefully in his sleep on the night of Friday 9 November 2018. His passing is an enormous loss for the Australian folk music and dance community.

Daryl Powell made an outstanding contribution as a member of the Monaro Folk Society (MFS), and the community more generally, with his research on dances and musical tunes from the Australian Bush tradition and through his commitment to teaching bush dancing.

Daryl was an active promoter of participatory music and dance within the community, with a special focus on the music and dances of Australia, and taught bush dance classes for many years.

Daryl was keen to ensure that people from disadvantaged backgrounds were able to participate and enjoy the social, physical and psychological benefits of dancing. Through Daryl's tuition, many people from a variety of cultural backgrounds have also had an opportunity to engage in and enjoy bush dancing as an element of the Australian history and culture.



Daryl's research on the history of Australian music and dance, and his commitment to teaching and demonstration, has ensured that this key part of Australia's cultural history is very much alive today. It is a testimony to his vision of the importance of Australian music and dance to Australia's cultural identity and history. Daryl organised dance displays in nursing and retirement homes, neighbourhood functions, including many fetes and community events like Government House Open Day, National Folk Festival, Canberra Multicultural Festival and Floriade. This further demonstrates Daryl's commitment to promoting Australian music and dance as inclusive events and activities for the Australian community.

I first attended Darvl and Diana Powell's bush dance classes in 2002 and over the years I developed a great admiration and respect for their knowledge and dedication. I greatly appreciate the friendship they extended to me and their welcome into their circle of friends.

I became convinced that Daryl's commitment to promoting the Australian folk music and dance deserved a higher recognition. In 2011, I started gathering information that could support Daryl's nomination for an Australia award. I compiled various biographical notes and a description of the activities that Daryl had undertaken in promoting Australian folk music and bush dancing. The MFS also came on board to support Daryl's nomination, which was then forwarded to Governor General's Office. I might add that all this was done without Daryl's knowledge.

Daryl John Powell was subsequently awarded a Medal (OAM) of the Order of Australia in the General Division, for service to the community through the teaching, promotion and preservation of Australian folk music and dance, on 10 June 2013.

Daryl will be greatly missed by his family, friends and all the people who have had the privilege to appreciate his intelligence, sense of humour, perceptiveness, sensitivity and his deep knowledge of the Australian folk music and dance.




